Why Abstinence? Because it's the Law

Aim For Success has three sexual abstinence programs. Each program has a version for 6th grade, 7th and 8th grade and high school. The following is the Aim For Success outline for 6th graders.

6th Grade Outline for a One Hour Program

Introduction: Dreams and Goals

Laws protect you, and how you respond to laws can affect your ability to reach your dreams and goals.

Word Game: Like fire, sex can be good or bad depending on how and when it is used.

Pregnancy and Child Support

Students consider the challenges of a teenage pregnancy, single parenting and child support.

Abstinence = Freedom.

What is Sex?

Students get a straight answer to the question, "What is sex?" according to the law.

The students are surprised to learn that the law considers touching sexual areas to be sex.

Criminal Law

Each sexual crime (as defined in your state) is explained and helps warn students about predators.

Crimes discussed include public lewdness, indecent exposure, indecency with a child and sexual assault.

Game – Guess the Age

Having sex with someone underage can have legal consequences.

Students play a game demonstrating how difficult it is to determine the age of a teenager.

Sexual Offender Registration

Students learn about sex offender registration: who, what, how long, etc.

Examples of actual teen sex offender registrations are shown.

Students discuss how registering as a sex offender can impact different dreams and goals.

Sexual Abuse

Sexual abuse is never the victim's fault.

A sexual abuser is usually someone you know.

Sexual abusers may make promises or threaten you to never to tell.

Sexual abuse may involve pictures/videos, looking at each other's sexual areas or sexual touching.

If you are involved in sexual abuse, (1) Stop; (2) Run away; (3) Tell an adult.

Pornography – Cell Phones/Sexting/Internet

Pornography can be unlawful. An example of this is sexting when you are underage. If the picture shows someone under 18, it is child pornography and students could face legal consequences.

Dangers – Studies show people involved in pornography are more likely to commit sexual crimes than those who do not use pornography.

Pornography distorts sex by focusing on self and robs you of the best sexual relationship in marriage.

Sexual Harassment

Students are equipped to recognize and learn how to deal with sexual harassment.

Game – Concentration Memory Game

The law expects you to remember 100% of its details. Abstinence means you don't have to worry if you remember all the legal details. It guarantees freedom.

Survey

Most teens have not had sex!

A voluntary, anonymous survey is offered at the conclusion. Aim for Success sends the survey results and student comments back to the school.
